

History of the Vic-Maui International Yacht Race

The first Vic-Maui race was sailed in 1965. The race was a dream of Royal Vancouver Yacht Club member Jim Innes who, at that time, was a Captain for Canadian Pacific Airlines. Jim apparently talked incessantly about the idea of such a race originating from Victoria and ending some 2308 nautical miles away in Maui.

He convinced three other skippers to start with him off Brotchie Ledge in 1965. Joining Jim and his Lapworth 36, *Long Gone*, was Lol Killam of Royal Vancouver Yacht Club with the 45' sloop, *Velaris*, N. Ron Ramsay of the Royal Victoria Yacht Club with the 45' ketch, *Norena of Wight*, and Boo Paskel from Seattle Yacht Club with his 73' ketch, *Tatoosh*.



The race and the weather were typical for most Vic-Maui races to follow. Beat into the Westerlies in the Juan de Fuca Strait, turn left down the coast to about the latitude of San Francisco, then a right turn with the northeasterly trade winds filling spinnakers and the downhill sun run to Maui. Three boats finished the race some 15 days later at Kahului Harbor on the north coast of Maui. The fourth, *Tatoosh*, having used the iron spinnaker, greeted the three arrivals with Mai Tais. During their stay in Maui, they met up with the originators of what would become the Lahaina Yacht Club.

Upon returning to BC waters, both Jim and Lol proceeded to convince the RVYC and the newly organized <u>Lahaina Yacht Club</u> to jointly sponsor such a race and thusly the Vic-Maui International Yacht Race was born. The first official race was in 1968 with some 14 boats entered. Bill Killam's *Porpoise III* swept the fleet; first to finish and first on corrected time. She took 17 days, 6 hours and 50 minutes.


The race, heralded as a FUN RACE, has encouraged both the ardent racer and the cruiser racer. It has been held every even year since 1968 with 2022 being our 27th race (no race was possible in 2020 with world health circumstances). The number of entrants has ranged from 10 to 37 boats and in 2022, there will be 15 yachts competing; 5 in the Lahaina Class and 10 in the Racing Class. The race fleets will start off of Brotchie Ledge in Victoria on July 4th and 6th and spectators will be assured a thrilling sight.

Records have been broken many times since this first race of 1968. The current Elapsed Time record holder is Gavin Brackett's TP 52, *Valkyrie*, of RVYC, completing the race in 8 days, 9 hours, 17 minutes and 50 seconds beating out the previous record-holder *Grand Illusion* skippered by James McDowell of the LYC, who completed the race in 9 days, 2 hours and 8 minutes in 2000.

My Remembrances of Vic-Maui

I have been involved with Vic-Maui for over forty years. This began with my first race in 1978, followed by my second and third in 1984 and 1986. In about 2004 I joined the Technical Committee for the event, primarily concerned with communications protocols and practices for the race itself. I held that post until 2020. In 2006, I was in Lahaina, as a member of the Protest Committee and as a greeter for finishing boats. That year, I was appointed a Trustee of the race and I held that position until 2020. As a Trustee, I was one of four mandated to "oversee the conduct of the Race and ensure continuity from one Race to the next". In that context, one of my activities was to see to the biennial updates and revisions to the Constitution and Regulations for the event. In addition to these duties, I undertook to assume the role of Archivist, and consolidate a lot of history and memorabilia for others to access and enjoy. Following the non-event in 2020, I stepped aside, letting others to gain satisfaction from serving as Trustee.



Over those forty and more years, I've had many moments of pleasure and joy, I've gotten to know many good people and I've amassed many, many great memories.

My first race was in 1978, aboard John and Barbara Dunfield's C+C 48 *Discovery*. In 1984 I crewed on *Sanfire*, a C+C 43, with Sue Liebert as skipper. In 1986, I was aboard *Sanfire* again, with Tony Liebert as skipper. In all three races, we finished in the middle of the pack, but in all three races, I came away with some great memories—some "finest moments".

One such was in 1978, on board *Discovery*. The boat had a habit of chewing thru spinnaker halyards. One night, about halfway across at 0 dark thirty the halyard parted, and we sailed over the chute. I was off watch, but I was the bow man so I clambered on deck in my underwear. It must have taken 20 or 30 minutes to get the

wreckage back on board, during which time I became totally soaked. When things were in hand and we had all settled down, I realized that I was almost naked, soaking wet, in 20 knots of breeze and I WASN'T COLD!

On the 1984 race, Sanfire had a good crew and we had an enjoyable sail. I particularly remember a late afternoon/early evening when I was at the helm, close reaching on port tack in perhaps 20 knots of wind. There were a couple of guys on the boat who thought they were God's gift to steering. For whatever reason, I really found the groove and for over two hours, had the boat doing 15 to 17 knots on a straight bearing, without altering course more than 5°. I impressed the two hot shots and certainly impressed myself as well. Another silly little thing evolved from the fact that the skipper brought along several pairs of socks, half red and half green. At mid-point in the race she came on deck and distributed the socks to the crew, giving each of us one red and one green sock (port and starboard socks). Our navi-guesser was sitting in the cockpit to put his new socks on. At the time he had his legs crossed. He proceeded to put the red sock on his left-most foot, and the green one on the other. Of course, when he stood, the socks were on the wrong feet.


In 1986 I was again aboard *Sanfire*. There were several details of that race that stick in my mind. The first was about two days of sailing thru a dense mat of *velella velella* (like a jellyfish) off the coast of Washington and Oregon. That was followed by another two days of very nasty weather where the wind seemed to always blow in three directions at once and the seas had a continuous steep, and very uncomfortable, chop. Things calmed down and we had more than a day (including the Owner's birthday) of being accompanied by about one hundred dolphins. They were often so close to the boat that we could reach out to touch them. Quite wonderful. To close out this odd passage, there was a minor disaster aboard. I can't remember the cause—possibly the generator died—but we spent three days with no instrument lights, so sailing at night became a bit of a challenge.

I'd love to do the race one more time but, to paraphrase Groucho Marx, I wouldn't sail in any boat that would have me as a member of the crew.

I was in Lahaina for the finish of every race since 2006 and will be there this year. In those seven visits, I've gotten to know a bunch of good people at Lahaina Yacht Club, greeted almost every finishing boat, attended (and drunk mai tais at) almost every dock party, and been to every awards ceremony (which seem to also entail mai tais). In all, from servicing the 21 winches on *Discovery*, to helming very carefully while a crew member is at the top of the mast in mid-ocean, to yelling "Aloha" to finishing boats, to being a presenter at an award ceremony, to creating the "Half Century of Friendship" plaque that you might see at Royal Van or at Lahaina, I have had great pleasure from this race. I wish for all of you participating this year or any future year, great sailing and great memories.

The first Vic-Maui was sailed in 1965. The race was a dream of Royal Vancouver Yacht Club member JG (Jim) Innes who, at that time, was a Captain for Canadian Pacific Airlines. Jim convinced three other skippers to start with him off Brotchie Ledge in 1965. With Jim in his Lapworth 36' "Long gone", there was Lol Killam of the Royal Vancouver Yacht Club with the 45' sloop "Velaris", Ron Ramsay of the Royal Victoria Yacht Club with the 45' ketch "Norena of Wight" and Boo Paskel from Seattle Yacht Club with his 73' ketch "Tatoosh". The 1965 race and weather were typical; Westerlies in the Juan de Fuca Strait, a left turn down the coast to about the latitude of San Francisco, followed by a right turn under the North Pacific High and a gybe with the Northeast trade winds filling spinnakers for the sunny run to Maui. "Long Gone" won the first Vic-Maui with a time of 15 days, 6 hours and 55 minutes. Records have been broken many times since 1965.

The current record holder is "Valkyrie", skippered by Gavin Brackett of the Royal Vancouver Yacht Club, who completed the race in 8 days, 9 hours and 17 minutes in 2016.

In fall 2021, Red Sheilla was entered in Cascadian Convoy, followed by 2022 Southern Straits, PNW Offshore and Swiftsure races.

In 2022 Vic-Maui will be marking the next 50 years of Vic-Maui. We invite you to join us!


